



# THE GREAT HALL PORTRAIT COLLECTION

The Great Hall at Queen's is home to a selection of works from the University's vast Portrait Collection of highly distinguished sitters by artists of international significance. On the North and West walls there are previous Chancellors and Vice-Chancellors of the University while the East Wall houses a more eclectic mix of noteworthy figures with significant connections to the University.

The Great Hall was designed by Sir Charles Lanyon in the style of the medieval Great Halls of England and the Oxbridge colleges. Lanyon's original plans unfortunately fell victim to budget cuts, and were not realised to their full potential. In 2000, Consarc Design Group referred directly to Lanyon's plans in their RIBA award-winning restoration of the Great Hall, creating a much-loved and theatrical space at the heart of the University. The grand organ on the balcony is from Christchurch, where Lanyon and his wife worshipped, and was restored with support from the Heritage Lottery Fund.

Hanging above the fireplace on the North Wall of the Great Hall is a copy of Titian's 'The Death of St Peter the Martyr' by James Atkins. Belfast-born Atkins (1799–1833) was sent to Italy by a group of patrons to study the Masters in the 1820s, where he is presumed to have made this copy. Titian's original painting, dating from 1529, was considered one of his finest. It was tragically destroyed by fire in 1867, so it is only through magnificent copies like Atkins's that we can appreciate the original work.

For many years, the only portrait of a woman to hang in the Great Hall was that of Queen Victoria in an 1838 painting by Sir George Hayter. The balance is being addressed, however, largely through the Queen's Gender Initiative's active commissioning of portraits of visionary women associated with Queen's. The first such commission was that of Professor Mary (Mollie) McGeown in 2002. One of the University's most distinguished medical graduates, Professor McGeown was named one of fifty women who had contributed most to the success of the NHS. Recent commissions have been of Professor Margaret Mullett by Stephen Johnston and Professor Carol McGuinness by Jennifer Trouton. The University is delighted to have commissioned a further five portraits of women leaders, to be unveiled in the coming years.
